# TAKING UP THE CROSS IN YOUR DAILY LIFE

And [Jesus] said to all, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me" (Luke 9:23).

These words are about the daily life of the Christian. They are about vocation. Our vocations are our places and roles in life, where God has put us and called us to love Him and love our neighbor. This happens in the home, in the church, and in our communities.

Luther called the various vocations God has given us "the masks of God." What he means is that God hides in our daily lives. God himself gave us our vocations, so we do God's work when we faithfully fulfill our callings. A pastor once paraphrased Luther on this topic as follows: "God himself will milk the cows through him whose vocation that is. He who engages in the lowliness of his work performs God's work, be he lad or king. To give one's office proper care is not selfishness. Devotion to office is devotion to love, because it is by God's own ordering that the work of the office is always dedicated to the well-being of one's neighbor."

This should impress upon us the importance of whatever we do in life. Often I have heard an elderly person in a nursing home complain that they are useless and worthless. They have forgotten this comforting doctrine of vocation. They are still called by God to serve others: by praying for them, by giving advice to those younger than they are, by simply being there for others to serve them. Another example might be stay-at-home moms who lament the loss of their "real jobs." They have forgotten their vocation. Their work of loving, protecting, serving, and guiding their children is a high calling. Indeed, the calling of mother is the highest calling without exception. Just think, the person most blessed in all of human history, the person closest to God, indeed the person who by God's grace carried the Savior in her womb, was a mom: the Blessed Virgin Mary. Her carrying of Jesus sanctified and redeemed motherhood to the highest level.

The truth beneath our complaints whatever they may be—is that the cross is in our vocations too. This is how God teaches us to deny ourselves and take up our cross daily and follow Jesus (Luke 9:23). Daily life requires a Christ-like sacrifice, sometimes even pain. Losing sleep for a newborn, sweating in the cold to free a wife's snowed-in car, finishing the laundry only to find most of it is dirty again—these things take their toll, not to mention the heartache of trying to love a strong-willed teen, to pray for an unfaithful spouse, or to care for a loved one whose mind is near gone. All of this suffering could be avoided if you were to abandon the life God has given you to live. But "we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them" (Eph. 2:10).

How shall we bear these crosses? Where does our help come from? In order to find joy and contentment in our vocations we must know that our Father is pleased with our service. He delights in it and counts it as perfect, holy, and blessed for the sake of Jesus' cross. Yes, we may find some aid in the good gifts of this world God has given us: helpful advice from others, books, and experts. However, these only treat the symptoms. For true healing and strength we must return to our first calling as Christian, to our Baptism. Here we may bear these crosses, but only because Christ has born them for us. Ultimately we must walk by faith, and trust that our crosses, our vocations, our offices, will be sanctified by Jesus and will one day be glorified.

# HEALTHY HABITS: DON'T FORGET THE HELMET!

Spring is in the air and as of the writing of this newsletter article, we have been blessed with some beautiful spring days! So what does this mean? It means it's time to break out those bicycles that have been stored away for winter and get out and have some family fun! But along with dusting off those bicycle seats, blowing up the tires, and making sure the brakes are in proper order, there is one other important thing to check off the "to do" list....your bicycle helmet. Let's look at some important facts. According to *safekids.org, Bicycle, Skate and Skateboard Safety Fact Sheet (2014)* quotes:

- three out of four kids in the U.S. ride a bicycle
- Approx. 55% of children don't always wear a helmet while bicycling
- Except for the automobile, bicycles are tied to more childhood injuries than any other consumer product.
- Helmet use is the single most effective way to reduce bicyclerelated fatalities.
- Helmets reduce the risk of head injury by at least 45%, brain injury by 33%, facial injury by 27%, and fatal injury by 29%. One study suggests that helmet use can reduce the risk of head injury by 85% and severe brain injury by 88%.
- A child who rides with companions wearing helmets or adults in general is more likely to wear a helmet himself.

So parents, by persistent in your rules of requiring your children to wear their helmet and be good role models and wear one yourself. Nothing could ruin a beautiful day than a trip to the emergency room. So go on and create those fun family memories but always remember safety first and don't forget the helmet!
